on the occasion of the first UNISCAPE En-Route International Seminar "LANDSCAPE OBSERVATORIES IN EUROPE II"

which took place in Turin, Castello del Valentino, on 22-23 September 2014,

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considering that the Council of Europe Recommendation CM/Rec (2008)3 identifies Landscape Observatories as a useful approach for application in all Member States of the principles of the European Landscape Convention;

considering that the participation of European citizens in the decisions concerning landscape is a priority for their proper and effective protection, management and enhancement;

being aware that the Landscape Observatories may be the appropriate platform of democratic debate for participatory policies and planning of the landscape;

ADDRESS

 the Committee of Ministers of the Council of Europe to organise a special conference to exchange experiences and best practices in order to support efforts on establishment of Landscape
 Observatories in the different countries. This to be achieved through the preliminary constitution of European Coordination between all those existing LO on the basis of studies and activities already carried out by the three European networks UNISCAPE, RECEPE-ENELC and CIVILSCAPE and others.

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Landscape Observatory Documentation

"Landscape observatories, centres and institutes" (LO) are one of the recommended instruments for the implementation of the European Landscape Convention (ELC).

Their mission is to study and monitor the dynamics of the landscapes, and to facilitate the collection, production and exchange of information and study protocols between states and local communities.

(See the Recommendation on the Guidelines for the implementation of the ELC, CM/Rec (2008)3 Appendix 1, 10; II.3.3)

The existing situation presents centres for landscape observation, at various territorial levels, established by institutional bodies, as much as by civil society. The LOD Project promotes the scientific cooperation among the existing LO, aiming at reducing the fragmentation of the local initiatives and coordinate their potentials.

THE LAS PALMAS DECLARATION OF THE UNIVERSITY RECTORS FOR LANDSCAPE HIGHER EDUCATION IN EUROPE

Extraordinary General Assembly and first meeting of the Rectors of the Network on 23 November 2018, hosted at the University of Las Palmas de Gran Canaria

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<u>After 10 years</u> since the beginning of the activities of the UNISCAPE Network in support of the principles of the European landscape Convention, the academic institutions at the higher level engaged themselves to start a process leading to the presentation of a common declaration, with the aim to encourage greater attention to the <u>societal</u> <u>importance of Landscape in Higher Education in Europe</u> and to emphasize their firm commitment to a coordinated trans-disciplinary approach to Landscape research and <u>education</u>.



EUROPEAN LANDSCAPE CONVENTION

Florence, 20 October 2000

ARTICLE 6 – SPECIFIC MEASURES

A - Awareness-raising

Each Party undertakes to increase awareness among the civil society, private organisations, and public authorities of the value of landscapes, their role and changes to them.

B - Training and education

Each Party undertakes to promote:

a) training for specialists in landscape appraisal and operations;

b) <u>multidisciplinary training programmes</u> in landscape policy, protection, management and planning, for professionals in the private and public sectors and for associations concerned;

c) <u>school and university courses</u> which, in the relevant subject areas, address the values attaching to landscapes and the issues raised by their protection, management and planning.

BASIC PRINCIPLES AND REQUIREMENTS IN LANDSCAPE EDUCATION

(from Landscape in Higher Education. A UNISCAPE proposal for CoE recommendation, 2015)

On this basis, we, the Rectors, Vice-Rectors and delegates intend to reiterate here three basic founding principles of Higher Education in Landscape proposed by UNISCAPE and based on the European Landscape Convention and reference documents:

1. TRANSDISCIPLINARITY

2. INTEGRATION OF DEDUCTIVE AND NORMATIVE APPROACHES

3. LANDSCAPE BASED COLLECTIVE

We also suggest that Landscape Education and Training respond to the following Requirements:

1) A comprehension among the teaching staff of the challenges of teaching landscape in **an integrated way** is a first prerequisite of properly addressing the <u>challenges of future</u>;

2) LANDSCAPE TEACHINGS should be based on proper observation of the natural and cultural landscape features in the field, and study of the perceived values. This should preferably be practiced in real life examples of concrete landscape interpretations and projects, including analysis, diagnosis, landscape quality objectives definition, vision development, design and management guidelines (ELC, Art. 6);

3. LANDSCAPE EDUCATION implies putting forward a perceptive, sensorial and existential reading and interpretation of landscape along with geographical, economical, ecological, morphological and historic-cultural landscape analysis, and synthesising the results of these approaches into a suitably site-specific forward looking project to protect, transform or manage it, in an effective and sustainable way.

4. LANDSCAPE TEACHINGS in higher education should start from the premise that the *landscape is a basic element contributing to the sense of belonging*, <u>to people's</u> <u>identity</u>. The pursuit of this identity concept allows identification of the competences to use the cultural dimension of the landscape as a key element in the construction of a collective vision of landscape futures.

5. LANDSCAPE EDUCATION AND TRAINING should enhance the requirements of sustainable development and ecological soundness, integrating abiotic, biotic and cultural functions for the sake of biological and cultural diversity, in the natural, rural urban, periurban areas, in the land, inland water and marine areas, and along the coasts (ELC, Art.2).

6. THE EDUCATION in assessing "intangible" landscape values historically sedimented and recently perceived is crucial to define the identity of the landscape.

7. LANDSCAPE EDUCATION should pay due attention to the notion of collective space, and to the debate about landscape as a common good, accommodating both public and private ownership of the land. Methods and work forms should be promoted to create landscapes allowing a sense of "living together".

WE, THEREFORE, AGREE TO TAKE THE FOLLOWING ACTION:

1. INTEGRATE Landscape issues and the dimension of Landscape into each field and discipline of Higher Education in our Universities;

2. ENCOURAGE all Universities in our Countries to engage in Landscape Higher education and training;

3. COLLABORATE in fostering national <u>awareness of Landscape</u> topics in <u>University networks and Councils of Rectors</u>.
